## Minister's Message



### A Year by Any Other Name Would Smell as Sweet

I mentioned at an Inquirer's Class a few weeks back that a new schedule of Adult RE classes would be set at the beginning of next year. "January, really ... that far away," was the response. "Oh no, I said, next year... in September." There was silence. I laughed.

We can all get so used to our own ways of being in the world that we forget the idiosyncratic nature of our personal experience. September is the beginning of our new church year... when new programs begin, when we wake from the slumber of summer. If however you want to know when the new pledge or stewardship year begins, well, the answer to that one is July 1st. And then of course there is January 1st – a different sort of new year altogether ... but who really pays attention to that one anyway?

One of the most difficult things for members of a growing congregation to remember is that not everyone knows what you are talking about when you say "the beginning of the next year," or during Joys and Sorrows, "John is in the hospital," or during announcements, "the JPD meeting."

We at the Unitarian Universalists of Sterling have made a commitment to be welcoming to visitors. One half of hospitality is taking the extra time to explain what we mean when we say X, so the idiosyncrasies that make our

## President's Message



### It's a Big UU World Out There!

I just got back from two days in Valley Forge, PA, where Rev Anya, Linda

Weaver, and I, plus three other UUS members, attended the Joseph Priestley District Spring Conference. What is the JPD and what is a spring conference, I hear you ask. I'll answer that at the end of this column. I want to share the energy first because a very important part of this experience is sharing it with those who weren't there.

I attended three workshops and, while they weren't intentionally matched, the topics very nicely complemented each other. Strategic Planning and The Future of UUism both resonated with our strategic planning exercise last year. I listened carefully at both these workshops for ways we can turn our ideas into goals and turn our goals into action.

We would like to be a public church, involved in and known to our community. How can we get there? Some questions from the workshops that can guide us towards an answer: What percentage of our budget is spent on social justice activities? Do we have a connection with the social justice projects we fund? What percentage of our members and friends participate in these activities? Can we connect our actions with our faith? And there are questions for church leaders. Do we believe we are leading our congregation rather than just overseeing the operation? And are we developing a spiritual discipline?

congregation what it is do not make newcomers feel like outsiders.

Think of what it might feel like to hear someone say: "You all know Barry," when you have no idea who Barry is.

Believe me, I am not pointing a finger. Many people whom I consider mentors have shared that "a minister preaches exactly what she needs to hear." I am the one who said, "the beginning of the year" and meant September. No innocence here!

Some of this work requires recognizing who we gather to serve, when we gather. We certainly need to find a space that nurtures our spirits, but I believe it is possible to nurture our spirits while working with a depth of meaning to make certain that everyone who walks through our doors feels like he belongs ... like she has what it takes to fit in ... like they matter.

The Irish poet and philosopher John O'Donohue writes, "The hunger to belong is not merely a desire to be attached to something. It is rather sensing that great transformation and discovery become possible when belonging is sheltered and true."

We hold the keys to helping or hindering others from experiencing a sense of belonging, a sense that opens the door to transformation. That is a heavy key. Let us use it wisely and with open hearts and open arms.

May it be so.

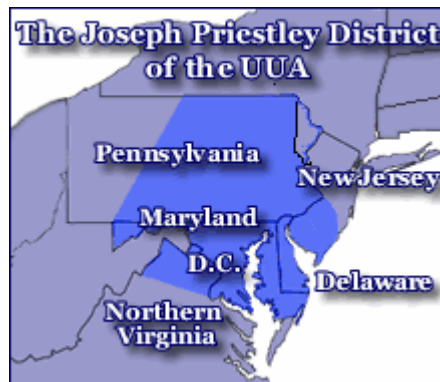

# Soul Work

Fellow congregants,

I recently attended the Soul Work series, led by Reverend Anya. Through reading and discussion, this class explored some of the deep and troubling issues connected to racism and white privilege in our society and culture. I was profoundly affected by the group and the topic. The course has reminded me of how powerful Unitarian Universalism can be in our personal lives and how grateful I am to have found a home at UU of Sterling!

Maybe I'm an incurable optimist, but I think liberal religion is one of the last bastions of genuine human charity. Because of our beliefs and purposes, we are able to connect with the great mystery, the source of life, the transcendent Spirit of love regardless of our heritage.

Mindless creeds do not drive our agendas. As a movement, we are dedicated to rising above the human frailties of religious judgmentalism and guilt. We seek higher ground not glamour and we fear not retribution.

Ours is a noble tradition. The book "Soul Work, Anti-Racist Theologies in Dialogue" taught me how apropos it is that we should transform ourselves into a beacon on the hill with patience, perseverance, and understanding. Through the class, my eyes have opened, if somewhat foggily, to the benefits I enjoy every day as a white European-American, and I have begun to learn what it might feel like to share, in a small way, some of the pain our oppressed and disenfranchised suffer, especially our citizens of color. Anti-racism may be only one part of the whole mission within the purview of our goals for social justice. Yet I'm

convinced that the payoff for putting individual and congregational effort into the journey toward wholeness will outweigh by far any cost.

## Eco-Tips

This month's eco-tips are about reducing your paper usage, in keeping with the theme of the April Earth Day service. First of all, try to reduce the amount of junk mail you get. Sites like [catalogchoice.org](http://catalogchoice.org) help you get off many mailing lists at once. You can also call or email companies to stop receiving catalogs, and charities to get off their mailing lists. Given how many of us do our shopping and make donations online, many paper mailings are redundant. Some sites even have a comments box when you buy or donate, and you can add a note asking not to be added to their mailing list. If a mailing includes a window envelope that doesn't already have an address on it, use it to mail bills or letters. Next, buy recycled as much as you can. Demand for recycled products is necessary to "close the loop". Finally, be creative with your paper use. You can use the other side of (unfolded, unwrinkled) single-sided paper in your printer, and even somewhat crinkled paper is good for scrap paper or drawing paper for kids. And post-finally, recycle (of course)!

## Committee Liaison Reports:

Paul Roche reported that the budget looks good; we expect a surplus at the end of the current fiscal year which will help with covering deficit we expect next year. If requested, Paul will provide details about all expenditures made from the building fund for our new space in the current facility. We have \$172,000 in pledges for our next fiscal year. Our current budget assumes \$176,000. We expect about 9 more pledges for a total amount of about \$173,000 for the next fiscal year budget.

## Old Business:

**New Space. Facilities/Aesthetics.** The cleaning company is going to assign a new cleaner. The Board discussed the cleaning charges and agreed that it is a good value. Tim is checking on changing the bathroom doors. John Boone is the new facilities coordinator. The Arts and Aesthetics committee is working on wall décor. The kitchen counter in the old space is going to be installed by Bill Roman (Joan to follow up). Joan will check on when AAFCJ will install shelves in the closet at the front of the sanctuary. Bonnie will check with the Membership Committee about setting up a place to collect dirty dishes during Fellowship. The order for the new chairs has been issued and we are hoping for delivery in time for the building dedication. We discussed special lighting for the sanctuary and additional microphones. Paul will get estimates for this new equipment.

**Building Dedication.** Invitations for the building dedication will be issued Monday. Dorine will gather volunteers for a Building Dedication Committee and meet with them. Belinda will be the Board liaison for the committee.

**Website Maintenance.** Paul will see if Bryan can help with fixing the audio recording problems. Mike Miller will be the new audio tech when he's trained.

**Bylaws.** The Board reviewed the latest draft and recommended changes. With the revisions, Dorine made a motion for approval of the revised Bylaws and Belinda seconded the motion. A Town Hall meeting will be held after church on May 23rd to provide members with the opportunity to discuss the changes. Joan and Bonnie will meet to discuss presentation of the changes for this Town Hall and for the Annual Meeting.

**Subtenant Church, AAFCJ.** Joan and Rev Anya will meet with representatives from AAFCJ regularly.

**JPD Events.** The JPD Spring Conference in Valley Forge will be attended by Paul, Joan, Bonnie, Yvonne, Linda W. and Rev Anya. Rev Anya and Linda W. will attend the Hospitality workshop at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Silver Spring on May 1. The Leadership Day that was snowed out will be held at Cedar Lane UU Church on May 8th. Bonnie is planning to attend.

**Stewardship Campaign.** Paul reported that the Finance Committee's draft budget totals \$176,000. This assumes that we will receive a Chalice Lighters grant. The campaign raised \$173,000. The budget will be submitted to the Board before the next meeting for review and approval.

## New Business:

**Religious Exploration.** On Monday, April 12, from 6 to 9, Rev Linda Olson Peebles, the Minister of Religious Exploration at the UU Church of Arlington will be at Unitarian Universalists of Sterling (UUS) to facilitate a conversation about Transforming Religious Exploration at UUS. Childcare will be provided. Dinner will be provided with a requested donation of \$5.00.

**Annual Meeting:** Scheduled for June 6. Bonnie, Joan and Rev Anya will meet to arrange notices and mailings.

**General Assembly in Minneapolis, MN.** Our candidates for delegates are Paul, Bonnie and Clarice. The congregation will vote Sunday April 11 to name two delegates. [Bonnie and Clarice will be the UUS delegates.]

**Church Name.** The Board agreed to add a proposal to change the name of UUS to the Annual Meeting agenda. The vote is to decide if we will vote for a new name at the 2011 Annual Meeting.

**Building Fund Expenditures.** To date, we have spent \$4,800 from the building fund on various items including the chairs and dishes. Additional expenditures are planned. Purchases from the fund must be tangible and transferable so that they could be used in a new church building.

**Hymnals.** Joan made the motion, Dorine seconded and the Board approved ordering hymnals using the Building Fund. We will hold a fundraiser later to recover the cost of hymnals for the general fund.

**Lifespan Faith Development Council.** Linda W. reported that the Lifespan Faith Development Council has requests for purchases totaling \$1,300 including shelves, seating, and flooring in the nursery. Some of the items are eligible for funding from the Building Fund and some will need to come from the budget. Linda W will send an email to Paul with the details.

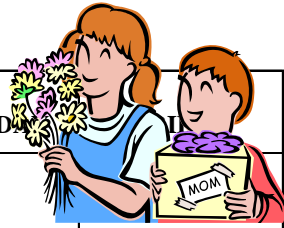
**Summer Internship.** The Board decided to consider funding an internship next year.

**Mythica Concert.** Joan made a motion, Dorine seconded, and the Board approved hosting Mythica on August 27 for a two-hour show. This will be a fundraiser with half of the proceeds for the band and half for UUS.

**Cards.** The Board signed cards for Steve and Michelle for their work on the Stewardship Campaign and a get-well card to Lindy Reeder.

**Next Meeting.** The next Board meeting will be May 5th. Belinda will provide readings and salad.
