### What Do We Do Now?

Personally, I have been listening to a lot more bluegrass! The other day I turned

the dial of my car radio from NPR to CD and put in a favorite bluegrass anthology. I wake up to the news, and I often fall asleep to the melodious voices on NPR late night. I figured my ears and my heart needed a new daytime focus.

I can't even begin to express the uncertainty that wells up in my heart and likely in all our hearts when we consider the present economic crisis. Memories flood my mind of the freezer from my childhood. My Bubby (Jewish for Grandmother) lived with us and was in charge of our shopping. She lived through the great depression and wouldn't make a trip to the store without stocking up on enough food for long-term survival. She had lived through the terror of scarcity and feared another such crisis. A bull market did not placate her. She likened a strong economy to a movie set – it looks good from the front, but when you sneack around the back all you see is smoke and mirrors.

In a way, I feel her actions have been vindicated. Her strange and seemingly egregious efforts of days past finally make sense. Maybe I too should stock up on necessities.

But what are my necessities? I have been calling my friends with more consistency – reaching out and making sure they are well. I have been meditating, or thinking that I really

should. I have been worrying, a heck of a lot more than I used to. And I have been listening to a lot more bluegrass.

I love bluegrass music. I grew up in the northeast where no one listened to bluegrass unless someone fooled them by saying it was the new chi-chi form of improvisational jazz. Then I attended a college in Tennessee. I remember the first time I heard the local bluegrass band playing their foreign twangy music. I was mesmerized by the feeling it encouraged. A big smile grew on my face – a simple smile. This was happy music - music that didn't care to be high class, music that grew from the roots of family and lived in the culture. This was music that wouldn't exist had sons and daughters not deemed it necessary to learn the craft from their mothers and fathers. This was music that people played standing in a small circle, often facing one another rather than the crowd. This was music that seemed to come from a need to create joy rather than a need to be heard, seen, or found impressive. This was music that to my ears sounded real and necessary.

In this time of uncertainty we need to stock up on necessities – some that come to mind for me are joy, friends, family, compassion, and bluegrass. The changes affecting our world are profound but we are not powerless. It may be difficult to protect ourselves from every loss, but we can surround ourselves with those things that are, for us, both beautiful and holy.

Alternative Gift Fairs offer an alternative to the commercial holiday shopping experience. Rather than purchasing more "stuff" that your friends, family members, colleagues and others might not need, alternative gift fairs offer attendees the opportunity to honor special people in their lives by making donations in their names to local charities. Alternative gifts range in price from \$10-\$50 and include things like immunizations for an uninsured child, an overnight stay in a homeless shelter, or transportation for a senior citizen to a medical appointment. All donations go directly to the charities. Purchasers are given a holiday card, along with a description of the donation, to present as a "gift" to the recipient.

St. Gabriel's Episcopal Church has organized an Alternative Gift Fair in Leesburg for a number of years. This year they will share this profound program directly with our community. We will have an Alternative Gift Fair on Saturday December 6<sup>th</sup> from noon till 4. The day will begin with a potluck lunch. ## WEBS

The Women's Earth Based Spirituality ("WEBS") circle meets the 4th Friday of every month. Within this circle of diverse women, we explore the UUA sixth source if wisdom - "Spiritual teachings of earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature." Varying in number from 3 to 18, the group meets monthly to expand our collective spiritual experience by partaking in earth based or Pagan traditions. In the 6 or so years that we've been meeting, we've shared in seasonal rituals surrounding the Solstices and Equinoxes, the sowing and harvesting seasons. We've participated in healing rituals, "blessed" a medicine wheel, and drummed around many a fire circle. We've learned more about the healing properties of herbs and crystals, the Mayan Calendar 2012, and the festivals and celebrations of the ancient Celts.

We come from disparate religious backgrounds, to share and honor each other's search for the spiritually meaningful. We respect the differences that each brings to the whole, and are enriched by the new energy that each new participant brings to the group.

# Nurturing Spirit and Community

We are in the midst of uncertain times. You may or may not be sharing information about the economy or politics with your children. However, they may be hearing discussions about these topics or noticing tensions in the environment around them. Keep this in mind as you interact with your children and as you deal with your own reactions. In days like these it is especially important to make time for family, find time for spirituality, and reach out for support if you need it.

Without the experiences we have gained through living, children and youth may misinterpret what they see or hear, or they may worry more than we intend. The 12 year old daughter of one Unitarian Universalist Association staff member came to her parents in tears and asked them if they would still be able to afford to send her to college. On the political side, I had to explain to a youth in our congregation that not everyone in Northern Virginia or everyone who is young, or even everyone in his high school agrees with his views on the candidates. I also explained that there are people who back other candidates for well thought out reasons and with concern for the well being of all Americans. In the coming days we need to be especially diligent in living out our Unitarian Universalist beliefs. We must work to create calming practices and environments for ourselves and our families, respect people despite differing beliefs, and come together to support each other.

The children's Religious Exploration (RE) activities this month can help meet these goals, and all adults are invited to join in the discoveries. Adults and families will be encouraged to consider their own spiritual practices and theological beliefs, develop family rituals, and learn about the diversity of theological belief at UUS.

The kindergarten through 4<sup>th</sup> graders will explore what church means to Unitarian Universalists, and they will discover ways to take church experiences home. On November 2<sup>nd</sup> they will make chalices and a booklet of chalice lighting words to use at home. The next week, they will recognize church as a place of reflection, and they will explore a variety of spiritual practices. Later in November, they will experience church as a place where they can celebrate passages of life, have fun, care for others, and share ideas.

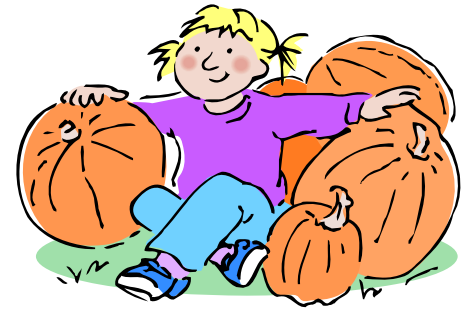
The 5<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> graders will find out more about the variety of beliefs at UUS, and they will explore how Unitarian Universalists come together in their diversity. To help them understand the many theological ideas at UUS, this group will prepare and carry out a poll of the congregation on November 9<sup>th</sup>. Near the end of the month, they will present the results of the poll to the congregation. In churches that have done this, the adults found it to be a valuable learning experience for themselves. So make sure to encourage the group and participate in the poll.

# Sponsor a Student in Kut

## UUS Partner Church

*Help create the bonds of friendship that create new global communities.*

Kordor is a 19-year-old living in a small village in the Himalayan foothills of NE India. Instead of attending school, he teaches school for the young children of Kut. Instead of going to youth group meetings at his church, he leads the church services at the Unitarian church in Kut. He earns \$12.50 a month – low, even for this region where most live by subsistence farming on less than one dollar a day.

Kordor plays a prominent role in both the educational and spiritual life of this community. His dedication and leadership at such a young age are remarkable – and worthy of support.

**In the weeks ahead, you will hear more about how you can sponsor a student at the Unitarian school in Kut.** You will learn more about the 35 students (pre-K through Grade 4) and two teachers and their lives...about the bamboo structure which houses their school and is ravaged by the monsoon winds and rain each year (see photo at right)...about the new block building being built as a replacement...about their hopes to extend school hours beyond the current two hours a day and provide nutritious food.

Each of us has the opportunity to share in the vision of better education for the children of Kut. **A mere \$50 will pay for a year of schooling for one child.** This money will be used for items like books, slates to write on (they don't have paper), benches (they don't have desks), completion and maintenance of the new school, teacher salaries, nutritional food, and warm sweaters for the winter months (there is no heat).

That is an impressive list of benefits for such a modest sum of money! Think about it – that's less than one dollar a week! As a sponsor, you will be able to learn first-hand how your generosity is impacting lives by means of letter exchanges with the students.

# UUS Board Meeting Highlights

October 1, 2008

## Finance (Paul Roche and Alyssa Lum)

Things continue to go well financially. Expenses are running right in line. Our new credit card process continues to work well.

## Minister (Rev. Anya Sammler-Michael)

Pastoral Care Associates: Yeah! We have Cyndi McCreia as the leader, Deb Rose, Karen Painter, and EB Kirkbride as members. They are off to a great start and will provide and serve the cake at the retreat (as a way to say "hello and here we are ... your new Pastoral Care Associates"). They plan to be fully operational by November.

Youth Group: The youth have begun meeting at noon after Sunday services three times a month. Advisers are Dave Scher, Bob Brown, and Allie Roche. Sora attended the Revival on the 27<sup>th</sup> of September and has been elected the Youth Group president. This may be a good year for the Board to consider creating a Youth position on the Board of Trustees as we have a strong Youth Group with many born leaders.

## Music (Scott Findley and Mary Matheny)

Kris Rector has been hired as the new choir director. We feel good about this new director and look forward to her tenure.

## Religious Education (Linda Weaver)

Congregation very supportive of RE. Many families are members because of it. This year we have a number of volunteers in RE who have been doing it a while, missing services, etc. Informal recognition by Board members as individuals would not hurt. New people are being asked to volunteer in RE.

45 children are registered in nursery through 12<sup>th</sup> grade; 23 volunteers in RE

Needs are 1 more volunteer for nursery to assist paid staff (Amy); 3 spots for elementary assistants; 2 spots for middle school assistants.

We may be more successful in getting volunteers if they knew more about what the job consists of. They will not be "thrown to the wolves"; it is really very organized. Successful churches treat RE as a ministry and present it this way to potential volunteers.

Sound in Nursery: It may possibly be easier to attract nursery volunteers if the service could be heard there. People to check out wireless were solicited, possibly Brian George, Bob Brown, and Mark McMullen

RE Space: We are at the limit in the two smaller rooms; middle school is full. About half the registered children attend. Trend is upward on population.

## Social Action (Linda Reeder)

Partner Church Council: Self portraits drawn by the children in RE were sent to our partners in Kut, along with a world almanac and a "Who We Are" package with short bios and photos of UUS Partner Church Circle members. They

will be delivered by Dee Idnani who leaves September 30 for the Khasi Hills with a pilgrimage group from the UU Partner Church Council. The Sponsor-a-Student program will be rolled out to the congregation in the coming months.

**New Business: Marketing Campaign:** The campaign is done on a metropolitan area basis; has been run 4-6 times before. Its purpose is to increase membership/raise awareness of UU in communities. Involves fundraising, planning, and executing the program.

First up is the fundraising to pay for the campaign. The UUS board voted to give membership rolls to UUA to use to request funds from members. Members will receive a couple letters. While the fundraising is occurring, the planning will include getting congregations aware of what will happen and ready to accommodate the increased awareness, if not potential membership. Metrics from success and means to collect data for measures are part of this. Will not be just increase in number of visitors, new people, but tracking of how many new people become members, how many visitors attend more than once, how many are still attending/becoming members after six months etc.

Part of the campaign execution is identification of an advocacy issue(s) that resonates with the community to generate media coverage/attention. Because the cost of all purchased media would be prohibitive, coverage as news is fundamental to campaign success. Issues of environmental stewardship (i.e., Greenness) with associated economic issues has been mooted as the possible front runner, but is undefined.

Of 29 Washington/Baltimore congregations, 13 have signed up for the first step of fundraising. Plans for the effort are for fundraising to start in October 2008 through April 2009 and the campaign to start in Fall 2009.





## November/December Artists

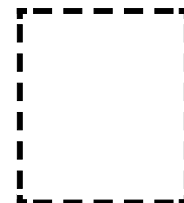
