Religious Exploration

An exciting new year is now underway in Religious Exploration (RE). There are new classes, new materials, new faces, and new routines. This year the children and middle school youth are beginning their time in RE with a "Spirit Circle," a short worship time. This gives them a chance to be together with all of their friends for a while each Sunday. It also gives them a chance to "do" church by actively participating in rituals such as ringing the chime, leading opening and closing words, and lighting the chalice.

In their classes the elementary and middle school students are focusing on Unitarian Universalism this year. Children in K-4th grade are exploring this topic by hunting for treasure with *Treasure Hunting* and other UU curricula. Throughout the year they will be searching for what they value in themselves, other people, and the world. The 5th-8th grade youth are journeying with the *Compass Points* curriculum. They are looking at where they have been, who might accompany them on their journey, and what tools can help in their travels. They are also beginning to think about the directions they may wish their lives to take. The children in both these classes began the year by exploring their own lives and the qualities they value in themselves. In October they will look at the importance of family and friends and they will explore ways to welcome new people into their lives and our church.

NoVA UU Legislative Preview, Sat. Nov. 15

Issues Survey now online for NoVA UUs to identify which issues concern them most.

For many of us, the Virginia legislature is a bit of a mystery.

The oldest state legislature in the country, the Virginia legislature is changing under the influence of the Commonwealth's shifting demographics, which leads to extremely interesting times in Richmond.

Join other UUs and like-minded members of the Northern Virginia faith community for a day of news and discussion of what happened in this year's session, and how that will effect what will happen in 2009. But first, take one minute and go to the online 2009 NoVA UU Legislative Issues Survey: http://www.surveymonkey.com/MySurvey_EditorPage.aspx?sm=URGl6wOBpcPSvBz9OcfPffPk2pCzvirSOXIQY%2bYYxs%3d.

At the Preview, we'll hear from Sen. Patsy Ticer, and Del. Robert Brink, as well as leading advocates, about what's coming in the 2009 session, and how we can be effective advocates for the policies we want to see enacted. And we'll announce the results of the survey to date too.

Workplace Discrimination Protection legislation will be a GLBT-advocates' focus in the 2009 session, which Equality Virginia Executive Director Dyana Mason will tell us about at the Nov. 15 Preview. Healthcare will be the focus of the interfaith community, and Executive Director of the Virginia Interfaith Center Rev. C. Douglas Smith talk about that and again share his insight from the perspective of a social justice advocate (and a highly effective one too).

The original intent of Congress — and enduring style of USO delivery — is to represent the American people by extending a touch of home to the military. The USO currently operates more than 130 centers worldwide, including ten mobile canteens located in the continental United States and overseas. Overseas centers are located in Germany, Italy, the United Arab Emirates, Japan, Qatar, Korea, Afghanistan, Guam, and Kuwait. Service members and their families visit USO centers more than 5.3 million times each year. The USO is the way the American public supports the troops.

Equal Exchange Coffee, Chocolate, Cocoa: For the last few years, we have participated in the Interfaith Program of Equal Exchange. This program pays a fair price to small farmers for their products, as well as offers affordable credit for these farmers and supports sustainable agriculture. The products are delicious and are very popular - especially the chocolate! UUS collects a small amount from each sale for fundraising. Come see the back table for a selection of products for sale!

Spontaneous Fundraising. As the spirit moves us, we plan other activities to bring in badly needed funds. We've had yard sales and flea markets, raffles, and bake sales. 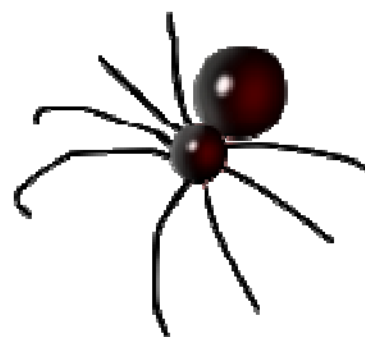
